## Fort Frances Voyageur Lions Club Serving Youth for Healthy Futures

### *Partnerships Impact Health for Fort Frances High School Students*

The Fort Frances Voyageur Lions Club in partnership with area professionals, held a “Healthy Futures Fair” at the Fort Frances High School, November 12, 2014. Focusing on prevention and early detection of disease, the fair was designed to create in students an awareness of genetic and environmental diseases and disabilities that they may develop as they grow older. The program is set up to encourage students to adopt a healthy lifestyle and possibly prevent the occurrence of such problems.

Carol Ewacha, a Lions Club member and retired nurse, helped spearhead the event. She noted in the Fort Frances Times, “It’s important for students to learn about what to watch out for and how to stay healthy. There have been health fairs in the community before, but nothing directed solely towards the students.” Lion Carol said once she had the idea to go ahead with the “Healthy Futures Fair,” it was easy to get local health groups involved.

For the past six years, the Health Fair has expanded and now includes participants from the Fort Frances Lions Club, local non-profit agencies, area health professionals and the Fort Frances High School staff. This year’s speakers included the Ontario Provincial Police, the Police Canine Unit and Diesel the Dog.

The Fort Frances Voyageurs Lions Club sponsored an information display at the fair about Vision. Additional booths offered information on family and children services, diabetes, hearing, mental health, nutrition, exercise, dental health and workplace safety.
